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What is environmental justice?

"Environmental justice embraces the principle that all people and communities have <u>a right</u> to equal protection and equal enforcement of environmental laws and regulations." - Robert Bullard, "Father of Environmental Justice" "The <u>fair treatment</u> and <u>meaningful</u> <u>involvement</u> of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income, with respect to the development, implementation, and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations, and policies." - US EPA

Why do definitions matter, and why are there so many?

Language has power:

- How a problem is framed changes **priorities**
- Definitions determine what the **policy options** are (1)
- Policy language influences legal landscape

...and social movements are often expansive enough to hold many definitions of justice concurrently (2)
